

Advent provides the opportunity to to wait, to watch, and to prepare together as a community. During the Advent season, our Sunday morning worship will continue to focus on *The Sermon on the Mount: Hopeful Living in the Kingdom of God.* It is good and right to learn more about how to live in the Kingdom of God as we anticipate the one who came to establish that kingdom. Although we have provided supplemental material here, we encourage you to continue to read Gospel of Matthew 5–7 along with us each week.

The liturgies provided are the prayers and scriptures we will use during our worship services for the lighting of the Advent Wreath. We have also included opportunities for you to reflect, practice, engage, listen, and pause each week. On each Friday during Advent, an audio version of a guided prayer for Advent from the book *Pause: a year of guided prayer and reflection* written by one of our elders, Holly Norton, will be available. Each of these tools are a means to help you move with intention through this season—not to provide another task to check off your list. We invite you to use these prayers, scriptures, practices, and times of reflection throughout your week—perhaps that will be around your dinner table, by the quiet of the Christmas tree lights, or in a brief pause midday. # What is Advent?

The Advent season is made up of the four Sundays leading up to Jesus' arrival on Christmas Day. Advent begins the calendar year for the church—the church calendar begins in the darkness and the longing of a world waiting for life to be birthed. This time of waiting represents the years of yearning for a Messiah before Jesus' birth and allows space for the longing for all things to be made new when Jesus returns.

The word advent simply means to come. And with the season of Advent comes our own invitation to simply come—to enter into this season of waiting fully present to the one who was and is and is to come. Let us name our longings as we wait in hopeful anticipation. Let us wonder again at how Jesus shows up in ordinary and extraordinary ways. Let us prepare Him room together.

## WEEK 1: WAITING WITH HOPE

### REFLECT

Kate Bowler offers this prayer: "May our waiting be filled with a hope that is both honest and defiant, a hope that holds space for all that is still broken while believing in a love that will one day make everything right."

Spend a few minutes in silence. How are you feeling as this season begins? What are the broken things you are holding space for? What are you waiting for the Lord to do in your life or in the world? The Psalmist reminds us that we can cry out to God out of the depths.

#### **PRACTICE**

Have a conversation with God about the things you have reflected on, perhaps naming your hope for how you want to experience God this season.

Is there someone in your life in need of hope? Imagine holding that person before the Lord and praying for hope. Consider reaching out to that person or writing him or her a card or text.

## **PRACTICE**


